We work in partnership with schools and community organisations to deliver leadership development programs at Bornhoffen or any place in Queensland.





QORF Award for Excellence

The **Queensland Outdoor Recreation Awards** recognise and reward excellence in the outdoor recreation community. The Awards celebrate individuals and organisations that have been successful in significantly improving outdoor recreation outcomes for participants and clients.

PCYC Queensland received the 2015 Riverlife Award for Excellence in Outdoor Instruction and Education. The recipient of this award demonstrates significant achievements in the delivery of outdoor recreation through quality education/instruction. The award was received for the PCYC State Youth Leadership Program which has been delivered by PCYC Bornhoffen in partnership with the State Youth Program Team since 2000.

This is the second time that PCYC Queensland has won this award. PCYC Bornhoffen received the Award for Excellence in Outdoor Instruction and Education in 2010 for the PCYC/Blue Light Catalyst Youth Intervention Program. Congratulations to all involved!



Leadership Development Programs

Leadership Development designs and delivers experiential and adventure-based programs with a diverse range of partner organisations and participants.

These programs aim to enable change.

Programs are about engaging in experiences that build self-awareness and social skills. These are essential ingredients for the change process to occur and they also align with the Australian Curriculum.

We take a community development and consultation approach. We design services based on identified needs and not simply by providing an 'off the shelf' set of activities.

PCYC Bornhoffen provides positive, real, memorable and meaningful experiences which develop individuals, groups and communities.

Positive - we are driven by the belief that the experiences we provide do make a positive difference in young people's lives by building self-concept, developing resilience, improving the ability to connect with other people and building a sense of community

Real - we aim to provide authentic experiences in natural environments with real consequences – a reminder that in life, there is no 'undo' button

Meaningful - our experiences have purpose beyond the here and now. Our aim is to provide insights and learning which will be can be retained and transferred into the individual's everyday setting

Memorable - we know that our experiences are powerful and are retained as 'landmarks' in young people's lives as they transition into adulthood

Leadership Development Programs

Our programs can be grouped into four main categories.

- Schools
- Community
- Youth Intervention
- Focused Leadership

Our programs vary in duration from a single day through to a nine day journey.

In the past twelve months, we have provided programs to nearly 2,500 individuals for an average of over 21.5 hours per person. That is equivalent to over 54,000 hours of structured learning programs.

This year, we have put together a number of case studies to demonstrate the diversity and impact of our work. These include programs with a selection of different partner organisations.

We have also included case studies on some venue user groups as these also make a strong contribution to youth development and broader community wellbeing.

Case Study: Assisi College

TARGET: FUNDING SOURCE: PARTNER SINCE:

Year 7 students (first year of high school) Included in school fees paid by families 2007

PCYC Bornhoffen works in partnership with teaching staff from Assisi Catholic College to plan and facilitate their annual Year 7 school outdoor education program.

The focus of the program is to facilitate connections, building of friendships and development of student confidence as they transition into high school. The students participate in a facilitated experiential and adventure-based learning program that is designed to help set the 'climate' for the student's high school experience at Assisi. The teaching staff from the College are very committed to the program and work closely with our facilitators to ensure the experiences on the program are applied into the everyday school setting.

"I am responsible for organising our Year 7 Camp each year. I have many options, yet I will not go past the incredible opportunities that Bornhoffen present to us. As a group of approximately 140 students and over 10 staff, our every need is catered to both comfortably and professionally. Accommodation is excellent and the food is exceptional, yet it is the capable, professional and approachable staff who ensure our continued bookings."

Case Study: Camp Oz - Children's Health Old Burns Centre

TARGET: FUNDING SOURCE: PARTNER SINCE:

Young people aged 8 to 16 years with a burn injury Children's Hospital Foundation 2008

Young people who experience a burn injury often need to adjust to living with an altered physical appearance and present with an invisible and altered psychological perspective. Young people with burns are at an increased risk of negative life trajectories during adolescence affecting their psychological well-being, engagement in education and career and/or civic or social contributions.

Camp Oz was launched through the Burns Unit, Royal Children's Hospital, Brisbane in November 1987. It was the first of its kind for an Australian paediatric Burns Unit. Since 2008, PCYC Bornhoffen has worked in close partnership with clinical and allied health staff from the Children's Health Queensland Burns Centre at Lady Cilento Children's Hospital to plan and deliver Camp Oz.

Camp Oz utilises a 3-day outdoor adventure intervention approach to build life effectiveness capabilities, increase positive mental health and improve behavioural functioning of children aged 8 to 16 years. The program is currently delivered each year alternating between PCYC Bornhoffen and North Stradbroke Island to provide two contrasting but complimentary experiences.









Case Study: Asteros

TARGET:

FUNDING SOURCE: PARTNER SINCE: Young males aged 14-15 at risk of exclusion from education system Funds raised by Asteros Association 2007

Asteros is a Greek word for 'shining star'.

PCYC Bornhoffen works with the Asteros Association to provide intervention programs for young people at risk of exclusion from mainstream education.

Young people are referred/selected from across a number of Catholic Education high schools on the Gold Coast.

The Asteros program is a two part outdoor experience - a three day introductory program and a five day journey-based program. Our staff work in partnership with Dr Jeff Kemp (school counsellor and Churchill Fellow) to facilitate the program.

The program has evolved and strengthened over time. In addition to the outdoor program components, it also includes a follow up residential experience, ongoing counselling/support as well as a parent skilling/support program.





Case Study: PCYC State Youth Leadership Program

TARGET: FUNDING SOURCE: PARTNER SINCE:

Young people aged 14-24 years PCYC Queensland community fundraising 2000

The PCYC Queensland State Youth Leadership Program (SYLP) is a six-day, five night multi-stage personal development, leadership development and community development training program designed for young people involved with the 54 PCYC branches throughout the state.

PCYC SYLP is delivered at Bornhoffen PCYC Leadership Development Centre. It is facilitated by PCYC Bornhoffen staff in partnership with the State Youth Programs Team and PCYC Club staff. The three sequenced levels of SYLP Program are Level 1 - Leading Me, Level 2 - Leading Others and Level 3 - Leading in My Community.

SYLP includes a combination of theory content and experiential activity. The program has been constantly reviewed and adapted to stay current with contemporary content including emotional intelligence, multiple intelligences, giving/receiving effective feedback, leadership and community development practice.

"From the minute the young people arrive, they are reminded they are young adults working in a team. Staff are there to support them in succeeding but not to prevent them from failing as this is part of life" Sergeant Linda Baade - PCYC Gold Coast

Case Study: UN Youth State Conference

TARGET: FUNDING SOURCE: PARTNER SINCE:

Young people in Year 10 to 12 Participant fees, donations and volunteer effort 2015

PCYC Bornhoffen is the venue for the UN Youth Queensland State Conference. This is the organisation's premier event and is one of the largest leadership and diplomacy forums hosted in Queensland. This three-day residential camp is open to all students in Years 10-12 and aims to provide them with an opportunity to meet like minded people and to learn the skills and techniques required to tackle the global challenges of the future.

The UN Youth State Conference provides a unique forum for students from across Queensland to engage in debate, workshops and critical discussion about the problems facing the world today and into the future, such that they might begin to design their own solutions.

"I liked having my stance challenged, getting better informed, and having my perspectives changed by others."

Case Study: MAMRE Community Retreat

TARGET: FUNDING SOURCE: PARTNER SINCE:

Young people with disabilities and their families Fundraising by MAMRE Association and user fees 2009

Mamre Association is a Brisbane based non-profit organisation supporting families which have children with a disability. The name 'Mamre', came from a Hebrew word meaning 'mountain of friendship'.

Mamre believes that people with a disability and their families can have rich, full and meaningful lives within their communities and is committed to working with families in partnership to inspire, embolden and empower towards a better future.

Mamre has been running its annual Community Retreat for young people with disabilities and their families since 2009.

Mamre staff and volunteers plan and organise the activities for the weekend. A range of arts, outdoor and social activities are run over the weekend and there is also the opportunity for families to connect and share their experiences.

Mamre also self-cater using our commercial kitchens to help keep the experience more affordable.

Our Venue

Bornhoffen was established in 1978 by PCYC as a youth leadership centre. Despite all the change over the past four decades, the need for young people to have a Bornhoffen experience has never been greater

Venue Maintenance and Improvements

It takes a lot to keep a place like Bornhoffen functioning. It's a 24/7 365 day operation and a busy customer focused environment. We are also operating in an environment where we need to keep our prices affordable for the community. Therefore, there are always tight budget constraints.

It's no ordinary job. That's where our venue team comes in.

Our venue staff work across a number of areas - bookings, finance, customer support, cleaning, workplace health and safety, maintenance, grounds, habitat restoration and (if there is any time left over), improvement projects.

A lot of this work requires the same tasks to be repeated many times over during a twelve month period with a consistent focus on quality.

For example, we have 35 toilets across five buildings that need to be regularly cleaned and serviced multiple times per week. This equates to over 3,600 toilet cleans per annum. Our water treatment system, swimming pool and septic treatment systems all need daily and weekly maintenance checks.

Our grounds, walking tracks and property are always well presented and this is only possible because of the ongoing mowing, brush cutting, garden maintenance and weed control that is occurring on a continual basis in one of the highest rainfall areas in Australia.

In addition to regular cleaning and sanitising required after each group has departed, there is an ongoing annual cleaning and maintenance schedule across all of the buildings on the property.

Our users are telling us in their verbal and written feedback that we're meeting or exceeding their expectations on venue cleanliness, functionality, maintenance and presentation as well as offering friendly, genuine customer service.






Venue Maintenance and Improvements

Some of the key venue improvements made during 2015-16 include:

- Full refurbishment of two Hobwee ensuites to fix water damaged floors including new villaboard walls, painting, commercial vinyl floor, LED lighting and internal fit out.
- Completion of final stages of office building including entry feature/sign, northern verandah, staff lunch room and various other items.
- New and enrichment planting of native gardens/landscaping around new office, Hobwee, pool and other grounds areas.
- Clearance of rocks/boulders by earthmover and grassing of areas to reduce weeds and expand maintained grass area.
- Removal of concrete and other rubbish from property dating back to the 1980's and earlier.
- New AV, data projector and screen system installed in Wagawn main hall.
- New Bornhoffen signage constructed for driveway entrance.
- New timber Hobwee venue signage made and installed.
- Design and installation of new acknowledgement of country/Yugambeh language signs across venue plus five environmental interpretation signs across property.
- New lookout area established on western side of property.
- Security/insect screens installed on all Hobwee cabin windows.
- New speed bumps, line marking and traffic signage to improve vehicle and pedestrian safety.
- Significant construction of new and upgraded steps on walking track system.
- Continued weed control and habitat restoration on property involving Green Army teams, Bornhoffen staff and volunteers.
- New wireless internet temperature monitoring system for cold rooms/freezers
- Removal of large group of coral trees (environmental weed).

The Yugamboh people who lived in this area thrived off the beautiful natural landscape and the abundance of nainforeat plants, seeds, plantful water and wildlife that surrounded then. Yugambah is the Aboriginal language spoken in the Quid Coset, Logan and Scaric Rim anass.

Here are Yagenbeh words for some of the animals you might see at PCYC Bornhoffen or in the surrounding area. Karti, Walaby Kabul, Carpel Pethon Wasahn: Crow

Kabul: Carpet Python Wagahn: Crow Wagan: Scrub Turkey Kaganu: Kookaburre

Catering

PCYC Bornhoffen has its own catering team which provides professional, healthy and tasty food for groups staying with us at an affordable price.

We believe that food is an essential part of a Bornhoffen experience. If the food is not good or there is not enough, this will impact on the whole experience.

Our food is freshly prepared and cooked on-site each day. All of our morning and afternoon teas are 'home-made' by our own staff.

We continue to ask young people to be involved with basic tasks including taking turns serving food, washing up their dishes and keeping the dining room clean and hygienic. This helps to keep costs down for our users but, more importantly, this is a valuable learning experience for young people about how to live and contribute in a community.

Our team are highly experienced in meeting the needs of people with special dietary requirements including food allergies, food intolerances and other speciality diets (eg. vegetarian, vegan).

Our friendly and flexible staff also provide catering for a number of functions and events each year including down to earth weddings, corporate standard menus and celebration dinners.

SELF CATERING FACILITIES

PCYC is committed to providing affordable experiences for families and the general community.

We continue to allow family and community groups to use our kitchen facilities where they would prefer to provide their own catering using volunteer labour. This community access allows a number of groups to provide experiences that would otherwise not be affordable for their members.

Large groups are required to hold their own food handling certification.



Habitat Restoration

PCYC Bornhoffen's location in the headwaters of the Nerang River catchment, adjacent to the World Heritage listed Lamington National Park and its access by the community makes it a strategic location for investment in habitat restoration and protection

Habitat Restoration

AUSTRALIAN GOVERNMENT GREEN ARMY

Green Army is a hands-on, practical environmental action programme that supports local environment and heritage conservation projects across Australia. It is funded by the Australian Government. PCYC Bornhoffen is partnering with Conservation Volunteers Australia to provide three approved Green Army projects. Each project involves a team of up to nine participants aged 17-24 years along with a team supervisor. Participants receive significant training and gain practical experience in workplace health and safety, first aid, conservation and minor construction work.

Two projects were delivered during 2015-16 with a total of 18 participants achieving some outstanding habitat restoration as well as performing some much needed construction upgrades to our walking track system. These projects will have a lasting legacy for the natural environment.

QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT EVERYONE'S ENVIRONMENT

Everyone's Environment is a Queensland Government program where local environmental and community groups could apply to undertake conservation projects. PCYC Bornhoffen received \$39,900 in Round 3 for a 24 month project to employ a habitat restoration worker to control madeira vine and engage with volunteers to undertake weed removal and plant 3,200 trees. So far, the project has engaged with over 400 volunteers from various schools, community organisations and our own PCYCs during the year. The project will be ongoing until April 2017.

Effective Practice



Key activities included:

- Membership of key industry bodies including Qld Outdoor Recreation Federation (QORF), Outdoor Educators Association of Qld (OEAQ) and Australian Association for Bush Adventure Therapy (AABAT).
- Participation in International Police and Community Supporting Youth Conference 2015 including a presentation on outdoor experiential learning and its relevance.
- Participating in the Queensland Outdoor Recreation Federation/Australian Camps Association Kids Outdoors 2030 Conference at Tallebudgera.
- Hosting interstate participants in the Kids Outdoors 2030 Conference as part of a leading centres tour in Gold Coast area.
- Participating in an Australian Facilitators Network conference.
- Finalisation of an external evaluation research report on the Catalyst program by the University of Canberra.
- Contributing to an article by Daniel Bowen 'Effects of the PCYC Catalyst outdoor adventure intervention program on youths' life skills, mental health, and delinquent behaviour' published in the International Journal of Adolescence and Youth.
- Participating in the biennial National Outdoor Education Conference 2016 on the Sunshine Coast including a joint presentation with Dr James Neill and Daniel Bowen from the University of Canberra.

- Participating in a Wilderness Medicine Institute Remote Area Frist Aid training course.
- Designing and delivering an intensive four day annual Leadership Development Team staff training including climbing skills, vertical rescue skills and paddling skills in a moving water environment.
- Designing and delivering a two day Facilitation Skills training course for south east Queensland freelance outdoor education staff on a user pays basis in partnership with Coefficient Adventure Resources.
- Connecting with the Yugambeh Language Museum to develop and install Yugambeh Aboriginal language signage in our venues and office.

All of these activities have been funded through the operations of the PCYC Bornhoffen business unit. When we reflect on this area of our work, we are very pleased with what we have been able to achieve over the past twelve months with a limited budget.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS PERIOD ENDING 30 JUNE 2016

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are a special purpose financial report for the Bornhoffen PCYC branch of the Queensland Police-Citizens Youth Welfare Association (QPCYWA). The financial report has been prepared in order to satisfy the reporting requirements of the branch and in accordance with group operating instructions for reporting. As the branch is not a reporting entity the requirements of Australian Accounting Standards have not been considered. These have been accounted for in the consolidated financial report of the reporting entity (OPCYWA).

The financial report has been prepared on the accruals basis on the basis of historical cost. The following significant accounting policies have been adopted in the preparation of the report.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of Equipment is depreciated over its estimated useful life on the straight line basis commencing from the time an asset is ready for use. The estimated useful lives applied range between 3 to 10 years. Building depreciation is accounted for in the consolidated financial report of the reporting entity (QPCYWA).

Employee Benefits

Entitlements applicable to annual leave and long service leave are measured on an undiscounted basis plus related on costs and expensed as the related service is provided.

Inventories

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and current replacement cost. Inventories comprise branch canteen stocks and other trading activity and fundraising items.

Revenue

Revenue for services rendered from activities, childcare, memberships, fundraising and rentals are recognised at fair value of consideration received. Advance deposits or payments in advance are treated as deferred income

• Grants

Grants received on the condition that specified services are delivered or conditions fulfilled are considered a reciprocal transaction. Revenue is recognised as services are performed and at year end a liability is recognised until the service is delivered.

State Office Support Charge

A number of services such as internal audit, human resources, marketing, zone development management, financial reporting and expenses such as external audit, computer software and insurance are incurred at a state office level. These services and expenses are allocated to each branch relative to the size and profile of the branch via the State Office Support Charge.

NOTE 2 - CENTRAL FINANCE FUND

The group operates a centralised investment fund. Interest is paid on branch funds on a monthly basis. The group investments are held in bank deposits at call and term deposits.

I am independent of the Association, and have met the independence requirements of Australian professional ethical pronouncements and the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012.


Audit Opinion
